Germany Asks 21,500,000 Tons of Imports Next Year in Note to Reparations Board

BERLIN, May 6.—The minimum imports needed by Germany for the year ending July 31, 1921, are given in a memorial to the Reparations Commission as follows:

Food and fodder, 5,500,000 tons; fertilizer, 300,000; coal, 2,000,000; mineral oils, 550,000; ores and metals, 8,500,000; wood, 2,500,000; raw textiles, 500,000; hides and leather, 150,000; miscellaneous, 1,500,000.

This amounts to 21,500,000 tons, as compared with nearly 75,000,000 tons in 1913.

5,500,000, who, with their families, represent one-sixth of the entire population. The memorial places the total tonnage needed to import these materials at 13,600,000, or about one-quarter of that of 1913.

Germany's pre-war mercantile shipping amounted to 4,000,000 tons for this particular transport, and therefore at the same ratio for the 1921 imports about 1,000,000 tons of German shipping would be needed. After the fulfillment of the Peace Treaty Germany will be left with only 300,000 tons, and she
